

# FROM THE PRESIDENT

With the easing of COVID restrictions and a return to life with a resemblance to that we have enjoyed in earlier times, your Committee has started to look at a resumption of activities that, in recent years, we have been only too happy to avoid. That is not to say that the danger of COVID is past. IT HAS NOT! Each and everyone one of us must continue to be aware of the continuing presence of the virus and take all necessary steps to avoid contracting it.



In late August, Bob Pink and I attended the Orange HQ of the Battalion, at the request of the Commanding Officer, to review with him and his senior personnel the large number of items of Mess Property that are "housed" in the Combined Officers' and Sergeants' Mess. The CO is concerned to ensure that the "history" of relevant pieces from both Messes be documented while some of those who were responsible for the presentations are still with us. Bob and I were able to identify a number of pieces and were able to point out that many of the items, which today are part of that history, were merely items in day to day use of the Messes back in the early days at Old Holsworthy and Wallgrove.

This task is ongoing and, if any reader has a recollection of a specific item donated to either Mess I would be grateful if they can let Bob or myself have the details in a short message. Some "unknown" items will be featured in future issues of *FRONTLINE* with the object of jogging memories. This is important as the Battalion has now been on the Order of Battle for in excess of fifty years and the numbers of those who served from the inception are diminishing. During that same visit we had the privilege of travelling to Bathurst, in company with the CO and RSM, to visit with the soldiers of Bravo Company during their Tuesday night parade. A very pleasant evening and an opportunity to talk to the soldiers in a relaxed atmosphere after they were stood down.

Wednesday, 7 September was the 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the declaration by then Prime Minister, John Curtin, of the warning to Australians of the Battle for Australia. The date was proclaimed a National Day of Remembrance in in 2008 by then Governor-General, MAJGEN Michael Jeffery AC, CVO, MC. Bob Pink, Ray Warden and I represented the Association at a very large Service, organised by the NSW Battle for Australia Committee that was held at the Cenotaph in Sydney with the keynote speaker being former Chief of Army, LTGEN Peter Leahy AC. General Leahy addressed the issues facing Australia today in a very cogent address. The Service was enhanced by a Catafalque Guard found by RAAF Richmond, the NSW Police Band together with their Soloist and Bugler, Piper Robert Pearce OAM played the Lament during the Wreath Laying Ceremony at which time I laid a tribute in memory of the valiant men of 2<sup>nd</sup>/19<sup>th</sup> Battalion AIF. Also participating were the Sydney Women's Vocal Orchestra and the Alexandria Park Community School Choir who performed the Australian National Anthem in both the Dharawal language and in English. The Welcome to Country was performed by Uncle Harry Allie BEM.

This quarter has started off with ups and downs – but then what could you expect from an organisation that represents many who are approaching their "centenary". One of our "matriarchs", Valerie Veronica Crawford (our very first "Mrs CO") has passed that milestone and is still going strong, Beryl Irwin ("Mrs CO" number two) is approaching that, having just celebrated her 93rd birthday. Beryl advised me that, reluctantly, she would not be able to attend the Annual Dinner in Orange on 29 October and that doyen of 2<sup>nd</sup>/19<sup>th</sup> Battalion Association, Shirley Drum, 91 years young also sent her regrets because the travel is getting to be too much. What we have to bear in mind that it is the wives and mothers, husbands and fathers that support the men and women who serve in 1/19 RNSWR, and indeed all of the Defence force, that deserve our praise and our thanks for that support.

Sadly, illness is also starting to move through our ranks with the sad passing of SGT Joe Clarke on Monday, 10 October after a stay in John Hunter Hospital in Newcastle. Joe was a staunch member of the Association having joined at its inception and will be sadly missed. Regrettably, Joe's farewell is scheduled for Friday, 28 October and this will prevent many members who are committed to the annual Reunion in Orange from attending. Also, on the sick list, are our Historian, Geoff Braddon and our Honorary Auditor, Dennis Zalunardo who are both receiving treatment for cancer. Our thoughts and prayers are with them both and with their families.

Having moved on from the restrictions imposed by COVID we now find ourselves impacted by natural disasters as the current weather patterns make travel difficult – if not impossible! LTCOL Gary Beltrame has sent his apologies for the Annual Weekend because he is not sure where he might get stranded and LTCOL Peter McGuinness is remaining in the fastness of Tasmania for similar reasons – although Tasmania seems to have as many flood alerts as the East Coast of Australia.

I even heard last night that a team of shearers had been marooned by floods out near Broken Hill so I am not sure whether we will see committee member John Elliott either. Needless to say, this is very disappointing but common sense must prevail and protection of life, property and livestock, as well as the welfare of the first responders has to be the first priority in member's minds. Interesting to see Association member Rocky Walshaw (the SES Commander in Forbes) on the 7.00pm news warning that the floods there might be around for some time to come, so I suppose Rocky will be another "no-show" on the weekend.

Sadly, my "expectations" proved correct and a number of members were prevented by the on-going "disasters" from attending the Annual Weekend on 28/29 October. We all owe Joy a debt of thanks for accepting the role many years ago and for the diligence with which she has performed her duties. Martin Pall was elected Treasurer at the meeting.

The main discussion at the AGM centred on the Association's participation in the Sydney ANZAC Day March and the very strong desire to see that participation recommenced. As I pointed out, the problem with participation was not a lack of willingness on behalf of the Association but A LACK OF INFORMATION from RSL NSW. The situation will be reviewed in the lead up to ANZAC Day 2023.

## RESERVE FORCES DAY COUNCIL — ACT BRANCH Chairman's Message

Dear Fellow Reservists, family members and supporters,

The effects of three years of Covid-19 have had a very marked effect on our annual commemorations and on the life of the Council in general. The National Council was 'wound up' last year.

Some of you may be unaware that the 'founder' of Reserve Forces Day, Lieutenant Colonel John Moore OAM RFD ED passed away recently. I sent our condolences to his widow, Virginia.

Next year marks the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the raising of the modern Citizen Military Forces the Citizen Air Force and the Royal Australian Navy Reserve. We hope to commemorate this at the Australian War Memorial on Saturday 24<sup>th</sup> June, 2023.

We are aware that many of us are getting older and that being out on what is often a very cold day is asking quite a bit. However, this is a very significant day and we would like to have as many people there as is possible. Without a reasonably large turnout, the commemoration loses its effect, and can be an embarrassment if there are senior service officers present. Your Council believes that if

we cannot expect a good number, we should not go ahead with a major commemoration, and instead just mark the day at the Last Post ceremony – to which, due to the current building program at the Memorial, numbers are limited. We hope that this will not be the case!

Your Council believes that the time has come to disband and we propose that this will be the last commemoration in Canberra. The combined effects of Covid, increasing age of our membership and the restricted access to the Australian War Memorial have taken their toll on us all. We will, however, still liaise with the Memorial to have the date of Reserve Forces Day marked at a Last Post Ceremony.

Yashmin Beaumont, Welfare and Treasurer of 4 ANTI TK Association advised with sadness on 20 October 22 of Ken's passing on 16 October 2022 - in his 102nd year

Kenneth was born on 17 January 1920 at Surrey Hills VIC and enlisted as a Lieutenant in the 4 ANTI TANK REGIMENT on 2 July 1940 at Royal Park VIC. His locality on enlistment was Balwyn VIC and his Next of Kin was Edith Dumbrell.

He served with the 4 ANTI TANK REGIMENT in Malaya and following the Fall of Singapore passed into captivity of the Japanese as a Prisoner of War. His records show he returned to Australia after the War and was Discharged on 13 December 1945.



Dining President Mr Roger Perry, Commanding Officer Lieutenant Colonel Biddington, General Campbell, Brigadier Couch, Colonels Martyn and Brennan, Ladies and Gentlemen:

May I begin by acknowledging the traditional custodians of these lands, the Wiradjuri people, and pay my respects to their Elders past, present and emerging.

I would like also to pay tribute to the unstinting efforts of your President and the ubiquitous Bob Pink, in fostering the Association and its rich heritage. Although other Associations try hard, yours is I think unique in its success in maintaining a quality publication *Frontline*, an informative website, and most importantly a practical connexion with the Battalion in being, notably through the Peryman awards. This year, the resurrection of the Pozieres Day service, now at St Columba's in Woollahra was a tremendous achievement, as is this weekend. I am also very grateful for the endless support Roger and Bob provide to our Regimental activities, including their participation throughout the Regimental weekend this year.

The Commanding Officer has rightly spoken of the present; it falls to me to speak of the past. In your Association resides the collective heritage of those who have served in the 1st/19th Battalion and its forebears: the 1st and 19th Battalions of the First AIF; the 2nd/1st and 2nd/19th Battalions of the Second AIF; the various militia battalions which have since 1921 bore the numerical designators 1 and 19, most notably the City of Sydney's Own Regiment as the linked 1st and 19th Battalions were known in the 1930s, and as the 1st Battalion was designated in the 1950s; all supplemented in more recent times, through Charlie Company in Canberra, with an infusion from the Werriwa Regiment.

The Battalion and its predecessors have had many distinguished servants who have brought lustre to its record, in peace as well as in war, and in civilian as well as in military service. Their examples inspire those who continue to serve in that tradition today. Some of their stories have often been told. A stained-glass window and plaque in the Sailors' and Soldiers' Memorial Church of St Luke, Clovelly, commemorates two of them: Lieutenant Colonel William Kenneth Mackenzie, who commanded the 19<sup>th</sup> Battalion at Gallipoli and on the Western Front, and was later a leading barrister, editor of the State's law reports, and author of a leading work on matrimonial law; and Brigadier Harold Burfield Taylor, who as a junior officer in the 19<sup>th</sup> Battalion on the Western Front received a Military Cross. His diaries provide the backbone of *Boldly and Faithfully*, Peter McGuiness' history of the 19<sup>th</sup> Australian Infantry Battalion. Between the wars he commanded Sydney University Regiment, 18<sup>th</sup> Battalion, 56<sup>th</sup> Battalion and 5<sup>th</sup> Brigade. During the Second World War he commanded 22nd Brigade – which included 2<sup>nd</sup>/19<sup>th</sup> Battalion - in Malaya, before going into captivity, where he established the University of Changi for the education of prisoners-of-war. After the war he became the Government Analyst, the then equivalents of the state's Chief Scientist, he became well known for giving evidence in criminal trials involving poisoning.

Also well known is Lieutenant Colonel Charles Anderson, a teacher, who received the Victoria Cross for his command of the 2<sup>nd</sup>/19<sup>th</sup> Battalion in the Battle of the Muar in Malaya in January 1942, in which the fierce defence of the crossroads at Bakri so enraged the Japanese Imperial Guards as to provoke the atrocity at the bridge at Parit Sulong – on which some of you have stood to commemorate the sacrifice of those who were murdered there. After the war he was elected for several terms as the Member of the House of Representatives for Hume.



But this evening I wanted to tell the tale of another, who is less often spoken of, though there is a short article about him on your Association's website, and an excellent account of his life by my colleague Rear Admiral the Hon Justice Michael Slattery in the NSW Bar News for 2018, to which I am much indebted.

Percy Valentine Storkey was born on 9 September 1893 at Napier in New Zealand. He came to Sydney in 1911 where he worked as a clerk for the Orient Steamship Co. In 1912 he joined the administrative staff of the University of Sydney and the following year enrolled as a law student.

With five years service in the Wellington Infantry when he was still in New Zealand, he enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force as a private on 10 May 1915; in September, he was commissioned second lieutenant. Described as a 'well-knit figure 5 ft 7½ ins [171 cm] tall with dark hair and eyes ... a laughing face and dare-devil, happygo-lucky ways', he embarked for England in December with the seventh reinforcements for the 19th Battalion. He joined the Battalion in France on 14 November 1916.

Five days later, in an attack on Gird Trenches north of Flers, he was wounded. Promoted lieutenant in January 1917, he was again wounded on 10 October during the 3rd battle of Ypres.

Then, on 7 April 1918 the 5th Brigade, including the 19th Battalion, was assigned to clear the area north of Hangard Wood, near Villers-Bretonneux. Intelligence had reported that the wood was 'lightly held'; surprisingly, it wasn't. The lead company of the 19th, whose men were tired, lay down in the FUP [forming up place] at dawn; some of them, including Storkey, who was second-incommand, fell asleep, and the company stepped off without him; it had advanced about 75 metres when he woke. He caught up with his men, only to encounter heavy machine-gun fire which had already struck a quarter of them, even before the company reached the edge of the wood. The company commander was shot in both knees and Storkey took over, leading six men through headhigh saplings to outflank the machine-gun position. When they broke into a clearing behind the trenches from where the Germans were firing at the rest of Storkey's company, one of the Australians yelled upon seeing the enemy, some of whom looked around and saw Storkey's party. Storkey instantly led the charge, engaging the nearest Germans before they could fully react. His party killed or wounded thirty and the survivors surrendered – there were more than fifty of them. Storkey's confident and determined leadership had created the impression that he led a much larger force than the handful visible to the Germans, which in fact were all that were there. For this, he received the Victoria Cross.

He was later again wounded in action, and was promoted Captain in May 1918. He returned to Australia in November 1918 and resumed his legal studies, while working as associate to a Supreme Court judge. He graduated and was admitted to the Bar in 1921.

On 15 April 1922 he married Minnie Mary Gordon, at St Stephen's Presbyterian Church, Sydney; they made their home at Vaucluse.

In 1925 he was appointed Crown Prosecutor for the south-western circuit, which stretched from Goulburn to Albury to Deniliquin and Broken Hill and places between. Perhaps unsurprisingly given his experiences, as a prosecutor Storkey was regarded as practical and realistic, with an outlook tempered by humour and compassion. It is said that having prosecuted two men for theft for removing a safe, blowing it open with explosives and then stealing its contents, Storkey later fell into private conversation with the judge, who expressed some reservations that he may perhaps have sentenced them too leniently. 'Dangerous men Storkey, using explosives like that ...', the judge said. The prosecutor, who had rather more experience of explosives than the offenders or the judge, offered reassurance: "Well judge, how else were they to get the money out?".

Storkey became an active member of the RSL and founding President of the Vaucluse subbranch, an office he retained for many years. He served in the militia in the 1920s, and resumed active duty in 1938 as the clouds of war once again loomed, serving as a legal officer on Headquarters 2<sup>nd</sup> Division.

But in May 1939 he was appointed a judge of the District Court, presiding in the northern district. There he became an identity, making many friends and being recognized for his quick assessment of character and his sound common sense. His cases were often reported in the (Taree) Northern Champion and the Manning River Times, according to which in March 1947 he dismissed an appeal by a butcher, George Bulley, whose lorry had run into some cows on the John's River bridge when coming home early in the morning, ostensibly after fishing, saying "No one travelling in a reasonable manner should run into a wall of cows without seeing them". Another unfortunate appellant was Victor Lyne, who had driven a motor lorry under the influence of liquor; in words that hold true 75 years later, Judge Storkey said "The sooner people realise that they must leave liquor alone if they are to drive cars, the better it would be for them".

One final apocryphal story must to be told. It occurred during the Second World War. There was a time when country trains were fitted with a special private compartment for travelling judges and their staff. This was a most salutary arrangement, because it avoided judges encountering those with whom they had to deal in court while travelling. As those of you who saw me on the XPT this morning would have observed, it has now been reduced to allowing us a vacant adjacent seat. Anyway, Storkey was returning from a sitting in Glen Innes and the train stopped at Whittingham, which as most of you would know was the entraining point for Singleton army camp. A battalion piled on. They were resentful that this man, a civilian, had a compartment all to himself. Envying the vacant seats around the judge, the soldiers began bashing on the door. Still worse, the Commanding Officer sent his Second-in-command to commandeer the apartment for himself and his staff. At this point, the judge's associate discretely left the compartment and spoke to the major. Then he returned and said to Storkey, "I don't think there'll be any more trouble". On arrival at Sydney, the judge received a grovelling apology. Later he asked his associate, "What on earth did you say to them?". To which the reply was, "Oh I just asked them if they knew they were making trouble for a man who won a Victoria Cross in the last War".

Storkey retired in 1955, and went with his wife to live in Middlesex, England where he died in 1969. He bequeathed his Victoria Cross to his old school in Napier; it is now held in New Zealand's National Army Museum.

Among the icons of the 19<sup>th</sup> Battalions, Captain his Honour Judge Percy Valentine Storkey, VC, the only Australian judge to have received a Victoria Cross, is deserving of a prominent position.


